1 Draw a picture together. Take turns adding more details. Give clues using words like on, under, behind, in front of.	12 	13 Use paper bags or old socks to make puppets . Put on a show together of your child's favourite story.	14 Check out these books : More Parts by Tedd Arnold I like myself by Karen Beaumont Yummy Yucky by Leslie Patricelli
15 Do the laundry together. Sort by colours, who it belongs to, and types of clothing.	16	17 St. Patrick's Day 	18 Ask questions so your child has a choice to make: "Do you want an apple or an orange?" "Do you want to wear your Red or Blue shirt?"	19 Make a scrapbook of your favourite things. Use pictures from magazines. Make groups like: Things to ride, things to eat, things to play with.	20	21
22 Play a Guessing Game . Describe an object and have your child guess what it is. Take Turns Guessing!	23 Together name body parts and what they're used for: "This is my nose. I can smell flowers, soap and popcorn"	24	25 Blow bubbles . Use long breaths or short breaths. Try to count the bubbles together	26	27 Make up a silly rhyme together! Like "The fat rat ate the cat on the mat"... The sillier the better.	28 Read a book together. Have your little one look at the pictures and tell you what might happen next.
29 	30 Fill a flat container with rice or flour and help your child draw the letters of the alphabet with their fingers.	31 Say your favourite nursery rhyme together. Pause, and let your child try to fill in the rhyming word.
